

ISF SENDS FEMALE FOOTBALL TEAM TO SINGAPORE

From the 21st to the 28th of November 2010, the Indochina Starfish Foundation (ISF), in partnership with Sports and Leadership Training Academy (SALT) and with the support of the Football Federation of Cambodia (FFC), has sent a female team to Singapore to represent the efforts of the ISF/SALT football program in supporting female participation in the game.

The event which is being supported by UWCSEA East Campus in Singapore and Barclays Capital is designed to raise the profile of female participation in football in Cambodia to encourage other young girls to take up the opportunity to enjoy the sport. Until 2009 Cambodia had never had a national female football team. The goal of this tour is to give females who enjoy the sport the same opportunity as males in the country and also to break down the social barriers that teach the children that a woman's place is not on the football field.

The tour will see the Cambodian girls play a friendly game against the Singaporean U16s National team on Monday 22 November. The rest of the

week will be filled with games against many other teams from International schools in Singapore, including the hosts UWC East Campus and sight-seeing for the visiting team. The week will finish with a 7 a side tournament on Saturday 27 November.

For many of the travelling girls, this will be their first (but hopefully not last!) opportunity to travel outside Cambodia and to showcase the growing interest in Cambodian girls in football. The youngest player, Srey Mom, aged

11 who lives on the fringe of the city's rubbish dump in Stung Mean Chey is part of ISF's education program that is giving street working children the opportunity to receive an education.

Of the trip she said, "My family, community and classmates are very excited that I made the team. I'm going to do my best to make them all proud". Srey Mom had received no formal education before studying at ISF's school and dreams of becoming a football coach or a nurse when

she completes her education.

The Indochina Starfish Foundation (ISF) is an international charity assisting some of the poorest children in Cambodia through education and sport.

ISF has setup a school in Stung Mean Chey commune, Phnom Penh working with children who support themselves and their families collecting rubbish around the city. ISF help the children with education, healthcare and food support parcels and assist the child in entering or re-entering the state education system.

ISF also believes every child has the right to enjoy his or her childhood. In co-operation with 25 other Cambodian and International non-governmental organisations and the Cambodian Football Federation and SALT Academy Battambang, ISF has developed a Football Coaching program to give children the social and physical benefits of participating in organised sport. ISF have sponsored approximately 2,500 disadvantaged or orphaned children training twice a week with qualified coaches and participating in regular leagues held from October to April every year.
